English Curriculum Overview 2023-2024

Our English curriculum supports pupils in developing the core skills of speaking, listening, reading and writing. English is taught thematically, and skills are taught at the point pupils are ready to access them. The themes and texts that are taught in our English curriculum are varied and engaging. Pupils will read: Shakespearean and contemporary drama; poetry; non-fiction texts; short stories and novels. Alongside preparing pupils for the qualifications which are right for them, a key focus during the study of English is that pupils are able to develop and express their views and feelings and cultivate a love of reading.

Pupils will complete formative reading and writing assessments each term. The results of these assessments will inform which exams pupils may be entered for. The qualifications which pupils may work toward are Entry levels 1-3 then functional skills level 1 and 2. Some pupils may also be entered for iGCSE. Pupils are entered for exams at the time that is right for them on their personal learning journey.

Year 10

Speaking and listening focus

The focus during this half term will be for pupils to verbally share information, opinions and ideas

Pupils will watch a variety of speeches and discussions and consider what good speakers and listeners do.

Pupils will have discussions with peers to share their opinions

A Christmas Carol' by Charles Dickens

Pupils will study the story, historical context and themes of this Dickensian novel.

Gothic Literature

Pupils will engage with a variety of short extracts from classic gothic texts such as 'Dracula' and 'The Tell-Tale Heart'.

Crime

During this unit of work, pupils will explore the conventions of a variety of texts and develop the composition of their own writing.

Heroism

Pupils will learn what makes a hero before looking at extracts from 'War Horse' by Michael Morpurgo and nonfiction texts about superheroes.

The Odyssey' by Homer

Pupils will study the story, themes, context and messages of this Greek myth.

Year 11

'Of Mice and Men' by John Steinbeck

Pupils will consider the themes, messages and allusions of this classic American novella.

Speaking and listening focus

The focus during this half term will be for pupils to develop their use of rhetoric, discussion skills and debate skills.

Power Poetry

During this unit of work, pupils will consider the themes and messages of work by various poets from those of the Romantic movement to contemporary feminist poets.

Music

Pupils will identify different musical genres and compare and contrast the qualities of those genres. The theme of music will act as a starting point for practising the composition of a range of transactional texts.

Macbeth' by William Shakespeare

Through the study of this play, pupils will build on their understanding of the power of language and begin to interpret Shakespeare's linguistic and structural choices. Some pupils will spend this half-term focusing on speaking and listening exam preparation.

Sixth Form

Exploring

There will be a particular focus on developing creative writing during this unit of work. Pupils will engage with a variety of exploration stories and multimedia clips for inspiration.

'The Pearl' by John Steinbeck

Pupils will explore the story and message of this short novella.

The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time' by Simon Stephens (play)

Pupils will discuss the themes of the play and develop their understanding of the conventions of drama.

Conflict poetry

Pupils will learn about the context of World War One and explore the views of people affected by the war through the exploration of poetry written at the time.

Dystopian fiction

Within this unit of work, pupils will consider the concepts of dystopian and utopian worlds. Pupils will analyse extracts from a variety of texts which explore dystopian ideas. Some pupils will spend this half-term focusing on speaking and listening exam preparation.

Final exam preparation.

Through this thematic work, pupils will be taught how to:

- create different forms of writing, for example: completion of application forms, leaflets, articles, letters, diaries, monologues, personal statements, reviews, stories or story openings, descriptions
- write to inform, persuade, explain and entertain

Homework:

Pupils will complete one of the following homeworks. The homework set will be appropriate for the pupil's reading level.

- Pupils developing phonic skills will complete spellings, short writing tasks and decoding tasks.
- Lexia Core 5. Core 5 is an interactive online programme which helps pupils master foundational reading skills.
- Lexia Power Up. Power Up is a computer-based program that adapts instruction to the specific needs of adolescent learners. The activities in Power Up support and build on Elm Court's English curriculum, focusing on developing reading skills in three areas: word study, grammar, and comprehension.

How you can support your child in English:

To support your child with phonic skills (early reading) and if you have an Apple device, you can download the Sounds-Write App https://sounds-write.co.uk/ipad-app/

If directed by your child's English teacher, encourage your child to make regular use of Lexia Power Up https://www.lexiapowerup.com/. Using Lexia for 20 minutes per day supports learning across skill areas of word study, grammar and comprehension.
